Girls Player of the Year - Micah Hart, Gibson Co.

Her senior year was full of accolades; 2024 Class 2A Miss Basketball winner, the 2024 Class 2A state champion and Most Valuable Player of the state tournament and the all-time leading scorer in Gibson County girls basketball history.

Give Gibson County senior Micah Hart one more honor.

Her play this season earned Hart the honor of being named the 2023-24 All-Gibson County girls basketball players of the year.

"All of them were great honors," Hart said about her season of accolades. "Being named Miss Basketball on top of winning a state championship was a great way to end my high school career."

During her senior season, Hart averaged 20.6 points, 4.8 rebounds, 3.9 steals and 1.5 assists, while shooting 53.3 percent from the field.

"I think my 3-point shooting, off the dribble shots, were where I improved this season," Hart said.

This year's Gibson County team stepped up to the challenge each night through a tough pre-Christmas schedule and a District 14-2A schedule that included three teams that played in the state tournament last season.

The Lady Pioneers only lost once, and that came Jan. 4 in a 46-40 loss to Crockett County.

The other 38 games on the schedule, Gibson County won by an average of 27.4 points per game.

"Everybody on the team wanted it," Hart said. "Everyone knew their role on this team, and we had to work together to win a state title."

Hart played a key role in that on a nightly

basis, and she did that as opposing teams keyed on her defensively.

And when the Lady Pioneers got to the state tournament, Hart was again up to the challenge. Gibson County beat a solid Huntingdon team led by Lilly Kee 58-49, then came York Institute, a state tournament favorite led by a Miss Basketball finalist in Reese Beaty, which the Lady Pioneers won 38-35 and then in the championship game was perennial power Loretto led by Ally Weather, which they beat 49-37.

"When we got up there, everybody felt good about the state tournament, and everybody came ready to play," Hart said.

In the state tournament, Hart finished with 57 points, 20 rebounds and 10 steals.

Prior to the start of the postseason, Hart was named a Class 2A Miss Basketball finalist, after being left off the list last season.

Three days after the state championship, Hart was crowned Miss Basketball.

During her career at Gibson County, Hart became the all-time leading scorer in program history with 2,404 points, passing Tiffany Adkins late in the regular season to take over the No. 1 spot.

"It is a great honor because there have been so many great players to play at Gibson County," Hart said. "The scoring record is a great record."

Along the way, Hart passed her sister Madison Hart and mother Christy (Hicks) Dye to overtake the top spot.

"We all played the game differently," Hart said. "Madison was a post, and I was a guard. We were all good in different ways."

Hart plans to play basketball on the college level, but she is currently still considering her options as to where that will be.



Boys Co-Players of the Year

Stephon Shivers & Fred Moore, Humboldt HS

When opposing teams scouted the Humboldt boys basketball team this year, they figured out quickly that they had to deal with two post players for the Vikings.

The duo of senior Fred Moore and junior Stephon Shivers were hard to plan for because stopping one usually meant that the other was open around the basket for an easy layup.

And statistically, they were similar. Moore averaged 18.2 points, 10.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists, while Shivers averaged 15.8 points, 11.2 rebounds and 2.4 assists.

The duo helped lead the Vikings to the Class 1A state quarterfinals in 2023 and back to the Class 1A state sectionals in 2024 to be named the 2024 All-Gibson County boys basketball co-players of the year.

"It is hard for people to stop us in a game, nobody can guard us," Shivers said.

Shivers is known for his play on the line as a three-star recruit, but he had a passion for basketball.

"Basketball is a great sport, and a sport that I love," Shivers said. "Basketball has helped me with my agility and footwork. My mindset is to dominate anybody that steps in front of me."

While Shivers is only a junior, this was his final season playing

basketball as he has committed to Georgia and will focus on being ready for college football during his senior year.

"It is going to be tough to give it up, but it is for the better," Shivers added.

He ends his career with 1,803 points, 1,203 rebounds and 148 assists.

Shivers knew how to play off of Moore and loved to get putback baskets as he played right under the basket.

"It was two dominant bigs under the basket," Moore said. "One was a passer, while the other was a scorer. We both looked to score. If you shift over to guard him, it left me wide open."

Moore has always been a basketball guy, and continuing the winning tradition at Humboldt was special to him.

"Basketball is just something that I

fell in love with; something I have been doing since I was a kid," Moore said.

He played more in the high post with the ability to hit the short jumpers.

Moore finished his career with 1,703 points, 860 rebounds and 72 assists.

After last year's state tournament berth, Humboldt played a loaded schedule with the likes of Christian Brothers, Hamilton Heights, Haywood, Memphis University School and Rockvale among others.

All of that was to set up a strong postseason run. Humboldt won 11 straight beginning in late January to get to the Region 7-1A championship game. But a loss to Union City in the championship game and a loss to Middle College in sectionals ended the Vikings run early.

"Last year was a surprise to me, but it showed that we worked," Moore said. "It was hard not to get back."

Moore and Shivers will move on from Humboldt with a chance to play in college as Shivers has committed to Georgia football and Moore has received interest from junior colleges like Dyersburg State and Columbia State.
